1. A brief description of the purpose of the travel.

4. a) Are there any potential areas worth following up as a result of the travel?

Yes- Porosity Agricultural Services have sold an extensive amount of weather stations to farmers around Australia that measure wind, precipitation, soil moisture, temperature etc. They receive all of the data from every station, therefore, have access to all of this information that is otherwise inaccessible. With the land owner's permission, this data could be released and utilized for research purposes. This has already begun to be used

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incorporating NDVI (Normalized Difference Vegetation Index) data and GIS by NSW DPI (Edward Joshua).

b) Any relevance or possible impact on the Australian Cotton Industry?

Yes- with this kind of data available, a more intimate understanding could be had across Australia on cotton farms which would allow for a more tailored approach to management strategies such as irrigation and sowing timing.

Through a word of mouth approach and possibly further research and paper submission.
