In recent years, rural communities have been faced with significant challenges including:

- 1. Severe ongoing drought;
- 2. Significant changes in government policy especially those relating to water and carbon;
- 3. The mineral resources boom

These issues have the potential to change the face of rural communities forever and so there is need to understand the current situation (*The Research*), our response (*The Workforce*) and how we can plan for the future (*Building Capacity*). To address these issues, a 'Sustaining Rural Communities' Conference was held in Narrabri, NSW from the 19th to 21st of April 2010.

The conference attracted up to 170 delegates each day from around Australia, including representatives from all agricultural industries, along with delegates from government and industries such as mining, manufacturing, finance, tourism, transport, science, education and health. Briefly, the programme for the three days focused on the following three streams:

The Research: social research concerning rural communities, economies and the impacts of drought and climate change.

The Workforce: Responses to creating and sustaining regionally flexible workforces with resilient communities.

Building Capacity: Building the capacity of rural people and their communities. Promoting innovation, social capital and networks.
